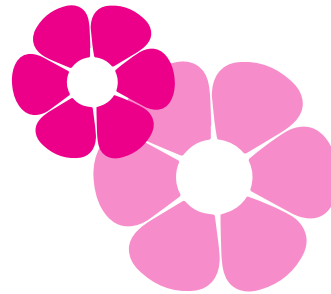

# Long Range Planning Update



**T**HANK YOU! Our three year building and youth pastor pledges will come to an end on June 30th. For the building, based on receiving outstanding expected pledges, we anticipate our loan balance will be between \$5,000 and \$10,000. What an incredible accomplishment! It has been a long journey and your generosity has carried us. While we now have a building we can enjoy for many years to come, we will have only a small remaining debt that we expect to be with us for a very short time.

Elsewhere on the building front, you may have noticed that there is one remaining room with "legacy" accommodations and that is the infant/toddler nursery (birth-2 years). We do not have funding available for a full renovation at this time (the initial fact gathering estimate totaled \$15,000) and this project has not gone through the LRP prioritization process that is planned for

the future to help guide our focus. That being said, we will continue to evaluate opportunities to spruce up this area to make it a welcoming space for young families. At a minimum, the nursery will require some renovations for safety and daily use in addition to basic aesthetics.

Again, we cannot thank you enough for your generosity over the past three years. As the pledges are accounted for and we have a better understanding of our final remainder, an update will be provided.

# Financial Peace University

*Do you ever feel like you're out of cash before your paycheck even clears the bank? If so, you're not alone.*

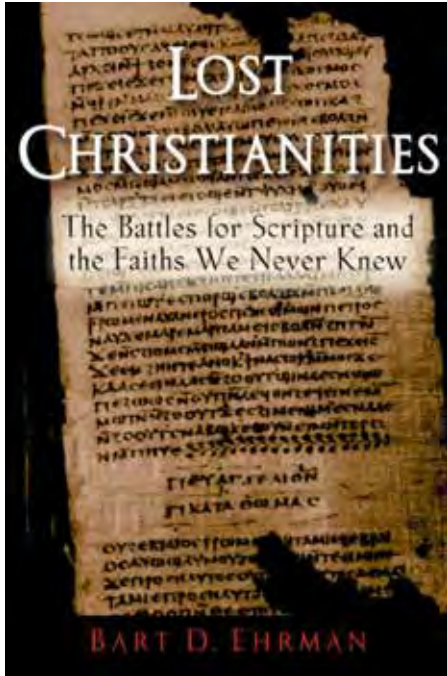

# Men's Study Group



How many Gospels are there? Would you believe more than a dozen? And that doesn't include the four in our Bible. How about Acts? And Epistles or letters? There are many more than those of which we are familiar! These are all discussed in the new book the men are reading and discussing on Thursday mornings: *"Lost Christianities: The Battles for Scripture and the Faiths We Never Knew."*

The early Christian groups that were spread throughout the Mediterranean basin each insisted they had the true teachings of Jesus and his apostles; moreover they had writings and other documentation that supported their claims. In this book, Bart Ehrman reviews these documents which reveal the varied and early forms of Christianity and shows how they

came to be reformed, forgotten, or even suppressed. Subsequent archeological findings have recovered their antiquities which reveal a religious diversity that has led to the current approach to Christianity written by the winners.

Ehrman is Professor and Chair of the Department of Religious Studies at the University of North Carolina (Chapel Hill) and has published a number of books concerning fallacies and truths about Christian beliefs.

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## Grand Piano to Become Ours?

Thanks to the amazing generosity and vision of our congregants, it looks like we are well onto our way to being able to purchase the concert level grand piano that has been in our sanctuary for the past four months. Spontaneously and in unsolicited fashion, persons have come forward saying that they believe this extraordinary instrument would make a worthy asset to this congregation that so loves music and an appropriate instrument to complement the talents of Johanna Schilling and others who shine with its use! So, we have presently received commitments or gifts for nearly half of the purchase price (which is around \$14,000). These recent four months of rental have been made possible by monthly sponsorship (provision of the rental fee) knowing that 80% could go toward the purchase price. Administrative Council has authorized the making public of the desire to raise the final half of the cost in hopes that we can add this instrument to our use permanently. (The only apparent drawback is the size of the footprint it demands and the impact on the Cantata, however a basic resolution has been devised.) To extend the possibility of raising this final amount, the rental has been extended through the end of the September (an additional four months) making the use of the Yamaha possible through the summer and into the Fall line-up. This additional four month rental

was provided by a donor who believes in this endeavor. Should you like to give toward the goal of purchase, please contact Shirley Krenzke, church treasurer.





# Family Promise® —Then and Now

Three and one-half years ago, 7 CUMC members attended an informational meeting about Family Promise, a national organization that provides assistance, guidance, and support for local homeless families, including staying overnight at area churches. With St. Boniface Episcopal Church of Mequon as our support church, our program has become a wonderful partnership. It involves the participation of dozens of people from both churches approximately every eleven weeks.

One of the best things about Family Promise is that people can use their talents in a number of ways for a very short period of time. Areas of service include:

- Setting up or taking down guest rooms.
- Bringing dinner or helping provide food and drinks listed on the food list.
- Providing a Saturday hot breakfast (which could be frozen ahead of time, ready to heat.)
- Staying overnight (9 p.m. to 7 a.m.) According to the national organization's rules, one male and one female should stay overnight.

- Hosting—visiting with guests or playing with children for a 2-hour slot (5-7 or 7-9 p.m.) Often, this becomes a time where volunteers have great conversations and get to know other members better!
- Co-Director—Well, OK, a little more time is involved, but with the program areas fully established for almost 4 years, it's more a matter of communicating with each area's leaders to make sure we're "set" for our week. This basically means touching base with the areas listed above.

We are grateful for all those who volunteer, and we would like to invite members of the congregation who have not participated to give it a try. In whatever area you can serve, you will find it rewarding—whether in the camaraderie of setting up cots or having a meal with someone who truly needs, and is grateful for, a program like Family Promise.

## What's new in the Kids Ministry

This summer is full of brainstorming and planning for what the Kids Ministry will look like in the fall. Jen Lange and Tricia Gruber have been focusing on how to make CUMC more welcoming for younger families, services more engaging for the kids and provide a place to connect for parents.

In the fall, we will be continuing with the Think Orange curriculum for Sunday School and are excited to have many of our volunteer teachers eager to return. One change will be, instead of incorporating Kids Time in service, the younger kids will be invited to leave service after worship for their own message and be welcomed back into service later.

We are adopting the name Mosaic Kids for the Kids Ministry. The name Mosaic is symbolic in that each person is unique in who God made them but when put together in community with the church a larger and beautiful image is created. The kids in Mosaic Kids will then graduate to Mosaic Youth when they enter Middle School. Keep your eye out for a Family Event later this fall.
