



Shifting the pieces, Creating a Mosaic



The youth ministry at CUMC has always strived to cultivate a community of students who long to embody a life of faithfulness to Jesus. However, faith isn't formed randomly or merely hoped for, but is formed by result of deep consideration, intention, and a willingness to commit to a faith community.

Our current group of 6-12th graders meets on Wednesday nights. However, I've listened and heard the struggles of several students and parents who cannot make Wednesdays work because of commitments to sports, music, and extracurriculars. Wednesdays used to be a night set aside for youth group, but has culturally become a night like any other - and our students have felt the pinch of a hectic lifestyle.

Our current structure has worked for a time, but has also reached the limit of its effectiveness. We have combined middle and high school thus far, and it has allowed us achieve critical mass during times of worship and ice breakers. However, we have also felt the limits that come from communicating to 12 year olds and 18 year olds simultaneously. If our goal is merely to serve the students already under our roof, then a combined group that meets mid-week will continue to do just that. But, I know that our desire at CUMC is to spread the good news of Jesus not only to our own, but to the students in our community who long and hunger for some good news, creating a magnetic style youth ministry.

With this goal in mind, it is my pleasure to announce two groups, both meeting back to back on Sunday nights; Mosaic Youth (6th-8th grade), followed by Mosaic Teens (9th-12th grade). Imagine two groups of students who are able to connect with God and each other in ways that are developmentally appropriate and exciting. No longer will our middle schoolers need to feel that certain topics or content is beyond them, and no longer will our high schoolers need to feel out of place or above students who are younger. Both groups should be able to embrace who they are and where they are in life. Mosaic Youth and Mosaic Teens aims to make this vision a reality.

Splitting our groups into middle and high school, and meeting on a different night of the week will (I believe) encourage the spiritual growth in our students as well as encourage them to invite their friends into the good things God has already started in our midst. But more than just this vision is needed for us to truly become who God has called us to be. And because of that, I'd like to draw you to the image of Mosaic artwork. The name of our ministry is not simply random or trendy - it points us to an idea that is bigger than ourselves. A piece of Mosaic art is singular, but plural. Though from a distance it appears to be one, when examined closely it becomes clear that a Mosaic consists of many small pieces of glass, strategically maneuvered to create something bigger than any of the individual pieces.

Likewise, when our students go through their days and weeks, they may often feel isolated, alone, or insignificant, and it can take a reorientation within Godly community for them to realize their place in life, the Church, and the world. Part of my goal is to help

students broaden their vision and start to see everything the way God sees it. No longer need they think of themselves as isolated; no longer as insignificant, no longer as alone. Like a piece in a beautiful mosaic, our hope is they might see themselves as part of something much bigger, much broader, and much more hopeful than they could have imagined. Our hope is they would see the world as Jesus sees it - with love, gratitude, and hope.

My hope and dream is that our ministry structure would never get in the way of realizing this vision. My prayer is that no part of our ministry would ever come between what God wants to do in one of our students lives. I truly

believe that with these changes will come growth; that as each of us continues to refine and focus on who Jesus is, we might find ourselves continually transformed in all of the ways He promises to transform those who love Him. My hope and my prayer is that not only our group would find themselves loving Him more, but that our church and our youth ministry would proclaim that hope and love to a world that so desperately needs it

served at 5:00 and we will be leaving New Beginnings about 6:15. Contact Susie Heiniger if you have any questions about the New Beginnings program.




COPE Hotline Celebrates 40 Years







News from the Outreach Team

THANKSGIVING AND CHRISTMAS OFFERINGS

Our Thanksgiving offering of \$323 was given to COPE, which provides emotional support and crisis intervention to Ozaukee County and the Greater Milwaukee Area. Our Christmas offering, given to the Franciscan Peacemakers Street Ministry, raised \$2,890.50. The Franciscan Peacemakers provide lunches to children, women and men, many of which are homeless or living in severe poverty, in neighborhoods where the crime levels are very high and prostitution is prevalent.

ADDITIONAL NOVEMBER AND DECEMBER OUTREACH EFFORTS

- Several hundred pounds of mittens, hats and scarves were donated to the Northcott Neighborhood Center and to United Methodist Children's Services.
- \$1,077.08 from Pecan Sales for UMCOR International Disaster Response.
- \$445 in gift cards, which was split evenly between Northcott and the United Methodist Children's Services. This provided Christmas gifts to some families and individuals who otherwise would have had none.
- 11 bags full of items for the residents of Lasata Senior Living, helping to make their Christmas special.
- 19 poinsettias delivered to church members.
- \$111.34 to Sojourner Peace Center from the 4th quarter coin offering.
- Food was collected and donated to Northcott.

HUNGER TASK FORCE
FREE & LOCAL

Cedarburg United Methodist Church is signed up to help sort food at the Hunger Task Force on Saturday, January 27th from 9:00 – 12:00 PM. This is an OUTSTANDING outreach for individuals and families, as it helps out so many families as they are Wisconsin's leading anti-hunger organization.

Food sorting takes place at Hunger Task Force's main warehouse, at 201 S. Hawley Court in Milwaukee (near the Brewers' stadium). The requirements are as follows:

- Activity requires lifting, twisting, bending, and volunteers to be on their feet for the entire three-hour activity.
- Closed-toe sturdy shoes must be worn – no sandals.
- Volunteers must be 12 years of age or older.

We need at least 25 – 35 people for each of the dates above. A sign-up will be posted in Fellowship Hall. This will be a fun, fast-paced volunteer activity for CUMC! What a great service opportunity for our middle and high school students and their families, as well as individuals. PLEASE JOIN US! Questions? Contact Pat Morrissey.

We will also be partaking in the Stockbox Building on Saturday, March 3 from 9:00 – Noon. This program – provides a healthy and nutritious box of supplementary food to low-income seniors. Each month Hunger Task Force delivers nearly 9,000 Stockboxes to low-income seniors at senior housing sites in Southeastern Wisconsin. We need 20 – 30 volunteers from CUMC, ages 12 and older.

- All Volunteers must be 12 or older. Anyone 16 or under must be accompanied by an adult or parent.
- All volunteers are required to wear tennis shoes or work boots.
- Please bring work gloves if you like
- Volunteers must be able to be on their feet for most of their shift and most volunteers should be able to lift 30 pounds.

ARRIVAL TIME

Volunteers are asked to arrive 10-15 minutes prior to start time to provide ample time for sign-in, agency orientation, and training.

REFRESHMENTS

Some groups like to bring snacks for their group to enjoy during the break time. Past groups have brought water, soda, granola bars, fruit, candy or other snacks and we have refrigeration for beverages or other food if needed.

SAFETY

Hunger Task Force makes all possible efforts to ensure a safe environment for its volunteers. Volunteers are under the direct supervision of Hunger Task Force staff and should follow written and verbal instructions for their own safety.
